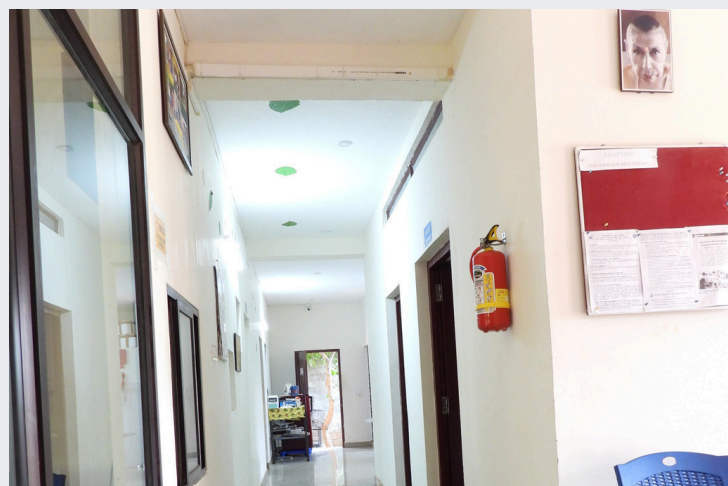

Our small veterinary hospital and rescue centre is situated at Plot No.86, 3rd Street, M Mahavishnu Nagar, Navarkulam Main Road, Moratandi P.O, Villupuram District- 605101, to provide medical care to the neediest stray animals who have no one to look after.

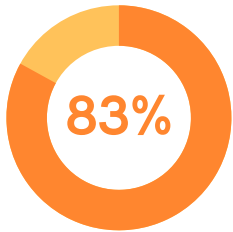


Puppy-cat cages where cats and puppies that should be isolated/ immobilised stay

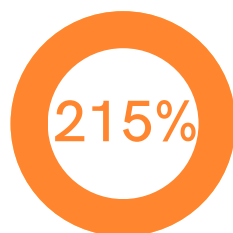

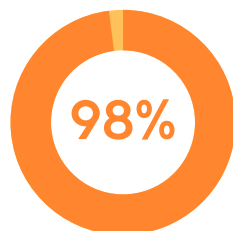

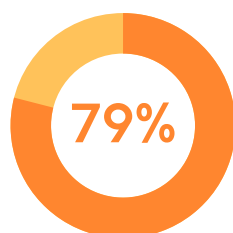

① Animal Rescue and Treatment

Helping humans through Animals

Understanding medical care as the primary help stray animals are deprived of, our primary focus about animal welfare is Animal Rescue and Treatment. A healthy society is made when humans and animals live in harmony in a sound environment. The millions of street animals in India are suffering for survival except a few that are taken care of by kind human beings.



Our rescue programme in Pondicherry was started at the very beginning of the Trust. It aims to provide medical care to the neediest strays who cannot ask for their own help. The human-animal conflicts can be increased along with the more number of animals that are unhealthy.



The animals that are rescued by the Trust or with the public help, would be given medical treatment, food and shelter till complete recovery. Once the animal is survivable, they would be released back to their territories after sterilisation and vaccination.



Our small veterinary hospital provides them the best possible care and medication with facilities of an operation theatre, x-ray, microscope and equipments like muscle stimulator, ultra-sound healing machine and physiotherapy machines.



Till April, 2022, **4921** animals has been rescued and given admission and treatment.

Total number of animals rescued in the year 2021- 2022 is **1558**, that is 83% increase than the previous year.

This calf was hit by an unknown vehicle and found with fatal injuries near Moratandi Tollgate, near Pattanur, Tamil Nadu. He has been rescued by our rescue team and given medical care and wounds got sutured.



After 5 days of emergency treatment and care at our centre, he has been shifted to Jaymal Jain Gowshala in Pondicherry for further care and shelter.





Piggy- our first rescue pig was rescued with broken front leg and spinal injury, as she was hit by a vehicle. She remained in severe pain for 2 days till we were informed about her condition. Rescued and brought to Bark India, the scared and un-friendly pig got medical care, food and comfortable space to stay in. She was completely unable to stand or walk.

Piggy started standing on her hind legs that were paralysed due to spinal injury, after one month of medical care. Her fear towards humans disappeared by the time. She lives as a happy and playful pig at Bark India.

Some Rescue Stories



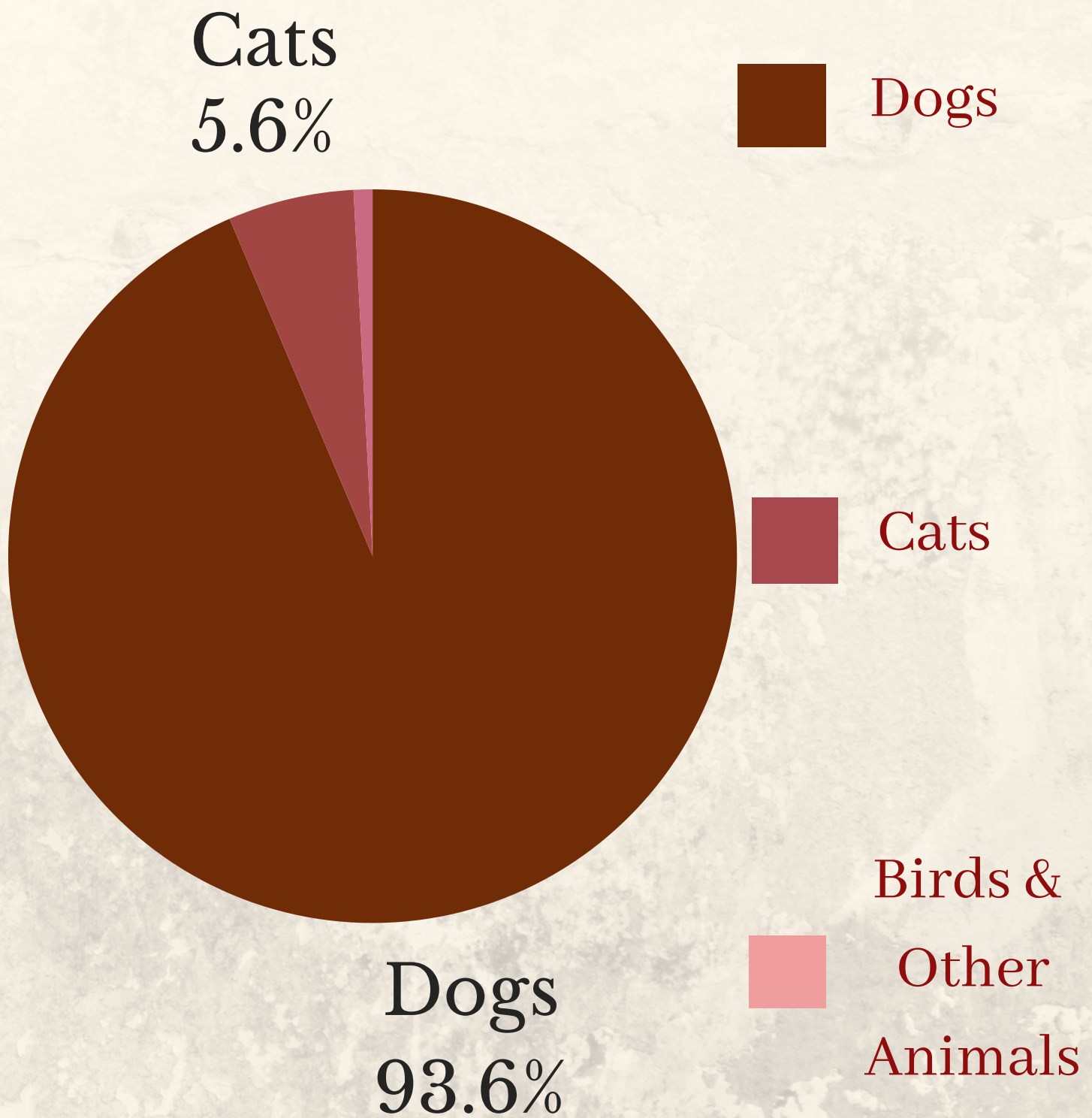
Good Boy- one of the rescued cats came with multiple fracture in right hind leg- Our vets decided to do immediate orthopedic pinning surgery and fixed pin on the broken bones. After 3 weeks of post-operative care, the cat recovered fully and adopted by the family of Ms. Sonia Das. Good Boy lives as a very happy cat in his new home, on 4 legs.



Aphy- this little kitten of 1 month old was brought to us with her right eye popped-out. The eye had been infected and lost vision. The affected eye was surgically removed and the kitten re-gained her health in 2 weeks. She got happily adopted to the family of Mr. B. Arun Kumar ,and lives a playful life.

Animal Birth Control and Anti- Rabies



ANIMAL BIRTH CONTROL

The most effective and humane way to control the millions of street dog population for the well-being of animals as well as humans.

The increasing number of stray dogs has been one of the major reasons of human-animal conflicts in India. While addressing animal welfare, ABC goes along with animal rescues with equal importance. The programme was developed by WHO as the only practical solution to reduce rabies rate and human-animal conflicts.

The Gov. of India has set up Dog Rules 2001 that made the ABC guidelines and we to do the systematic implementation of the programme.

We make sure all adult rescued animal is neutered and fully vaccinated before they go back to their territories. Providing combination vaccine of both multi-antigen and anti-rabies to prevent them from rabies as well as diseases like parvovirus, Canine Distemper, Leptospirosis, hepatitis, parainfluenza virus etc. We make sure they have a better life and health afterwards.

Why ABC ?

- Controlling the dog population and reduces rabies rate in humans and animals
- No dog fighting and injuries for mating during heat season
- Reduces mating aggression
- Minus the strain of pregnancy, females remain healthier
- The limited population has better accessibility to food resources
- One territory of sterilised dogs reduces human-animal conflicts
- The remaining dogs prevents the coming of new dogs into the territory
- Prevents sexually transmitted diseases like TVT and death rate
- Less chance of rabies and dog bites means less human-animal conflicts
- With no litters to protect, female dogs will not be aggressive.
- As less conflicts, animals become friendly and harmless



Our aim is to create a better human-animal friendly and healthy society through the systematic implementation of ABC.



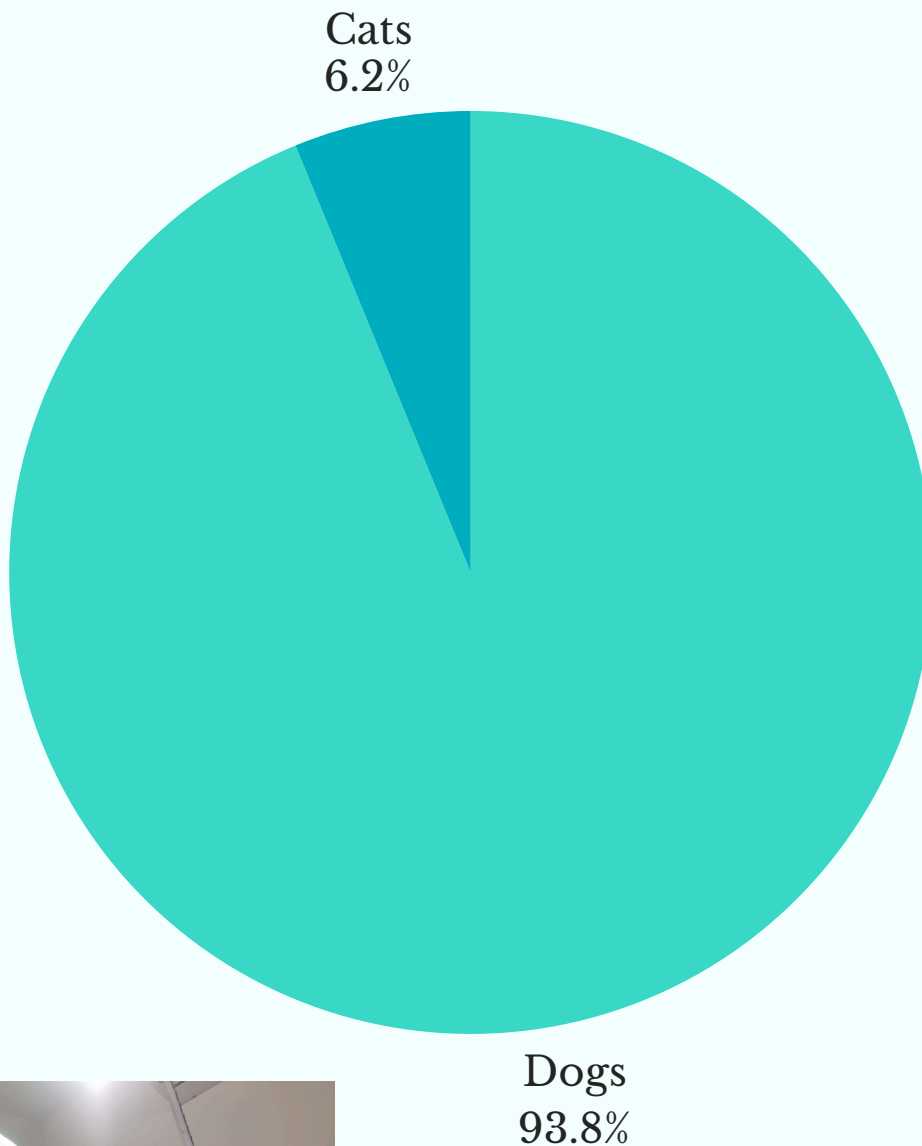

These animals', especially dogs'- aggression is reduced, more human friendly, healthy and vaccinated, share their space and being territorial, helps eliminating human-animal conflicts and creates a peaceful and protective atmosphere themselves in their places, and helps changing people's attitude towards them. It paves way for a compassionate society.

Gradually we notice the positive changes in the behaviour and health of the animals alongwith the permanent impact that makes in human-animal relationship.

ABCs at a glance

The number of Spay and Neutering done in the year is 104% increase than the previous year.



Animal adoptions aims at finding new forever homes for puppies /kittens/ abandoned dogs that are unable to survive themselves.

Animal Adoptions not only gives an animal a new life, but also has a great impact on controlling street dog population.

The programme was started with the initiative of finding happy families for the animals that are unable to go back and survive on their places. This includes stray puppies/kittens who stayed with us for treatment for a long time. A good number of abandoned animals get sick, have accidents, injuries, get other dog bites, face human ruthlessness etc on street. Such animals also get homes as they literally have nowhere to go.

It also put a barrier to the unlicensed breed dog industry that uses animals as a litter producing machine and dumps them when they are no longer useful. Through highlighting the advantages of our native Indian breeds, the animal abuse through breeding reduces and less number of animals suffer on streets.

Why Adoption ?

- Provides a happy and comfortable life for the neediest animals
- Reduces the number of animals on street
- On- time sterilisation of adopted animals greatly contribute to stray animal number control
- Helps reducing the number of people buying high-breed dogs that are not suitable to our native
- Less demand on breeding reduces the suffering of breed animals
- Animals who are already born gets better life and opportunity to live
- Develops values of compassion and kindness among adopted family's members
- Children of these families understand animals better and helps creating a better society
- Studies shows that humans can get stress relaxation to a great extend with the companionship of pets

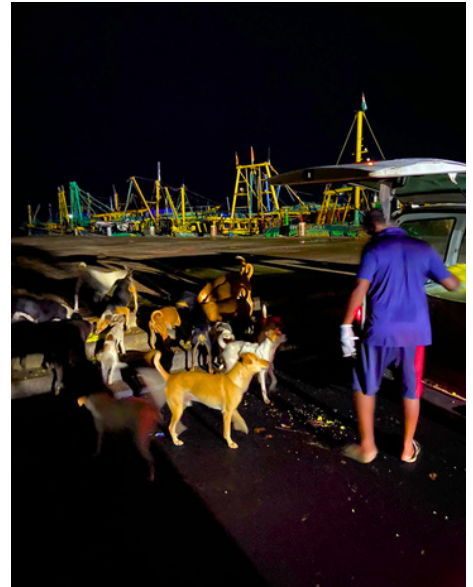


122 animals found their homes through the programme till date

Stray Animal Feeding



Food has been the most important or the only important thing for a street animals. It was during the first lock down of Covid 19 in India in 2019, we came to understand how literally these strays were starving without a single morsel of food. The millions of street animals who live depend on the hotel and restaurant leftovers, a few people who feeds them etc, suddenly left out of food and water, when suddenly humans as well as food sources disappeared.

The feeding programme was the immediate result of witnessing their terrible condition. The programme that started with the feeding of 50-60 strays around our centre now extended to above 550 animals every day with a healthy meal on their spots. Our volunteers and feeding staff reaches to these dogs with food and love in the industrial areas of Pondicherry and nearby Tamil Nadu, where food availability is less with less human presence and less food wastes.

Using 150 kilograms of rice everyday, a healthy meal is served to them to full them starving stomachs ,and love to their hearts.

Why feeding strays?

- Makes their life less suffering
- Less-dog fights for limited food sources
- Less injuries and health issues due to dog fights
- Less aggression towards other animals and humans
- Befriends even the wild strays day by day
- Befriending them makes easy to touch and catch for medical care and ABC.
- One area of healthy animals helps creating a healthy environment
- Befriended animals helps reducing human-animal issues
- One area is full with healthy, sterilized and vaccinated animals.
- Prevents diseases and death due to starvation and related problems

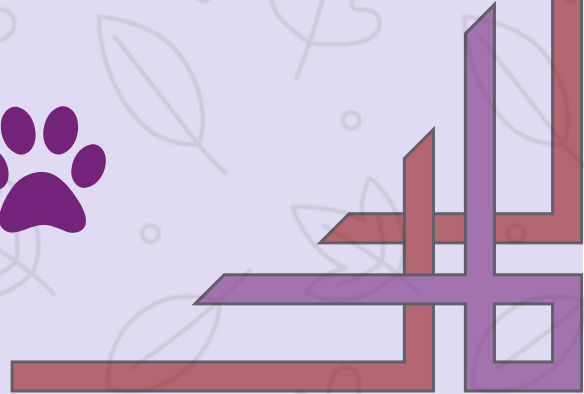
A few moments from Feeding



The impact



Feeding paves the first way to the systematic implementation of Animal Birth Control. As the result of feeding inside Pondicherry University, 85% of dog population inside the campus are healthy, neutered and fully vaccinated. That creates a healthy, safer and animal- friendly campus. The number of human-animal conflicts have been reduced substantially after implementation of ABC.



⑤ Veterinary Medical Camps



Help the neediest

Veterinary medical camps are aimed at helping rural people by providing medical care/ vaccination to their animals, where veterinary care is unavailable.

We are happy to help them by conducting medical camps in those villages where free medical check ups, first aid and vaccination would be given to them.

It helps making the animals healthy and reduces the chance of their health issues, prevents dog bites and rabies rate in humans and animals.

So far, more than 450 animals have been benefited from the 7 veterinary camps done.

Due to Covid 19 restrictions, we had to restrict our service to our clinic and nearby areas.

The programme benefited street dogs and community dogs that they are free from the possibility of getting rabies. It strengthen the human-animal relationships and reduces the life risk due to rabies.

Community dogs in the nearby areas are also vaccinated in the camp. The aim of the programme is the creation of a rabies-free world.

ON-SPOT TREATMENTS



Apart from rescues, On-spot treatments aims at helping animals on their places when they are in need of emergency medical care. This benefits animals whose admission is not necessary- especially large animals.

Street dogs/ animals/ community animals who have care takers like local feeders/ rescuers and animal lovers, get their medical care at the centre as out patients.

It makes the animal stress-free in their places than being inside the kennel, that helps for faster healing. For rescue centres, it provides more space for the neediest and make the public involved in the community responsibility of caring sick animals.

SPECIAL EVENTS

A Proud event on our way- A surgical training programme was conducted from 23rd August - 3rd September, 2021, at our centre in association with WVS Worldwide Veterinary Services- International Training Centre.



A 10 days surgical training programme was conducted in association with WVS- International Training centre that trained 4 veterinarians and 3 veterinary assistants as per the international standards and protocols of Animal Birth Control.

66 dogs were neutered and vaccinated during the WVS camp.



INTERNSHIP OF VETERINARY STUDENTS



54 students of final year B.Vsc from Rajiv Gandhi Institute of Veterinary Education and Research, Pondicherry, completed their 10 days internship at Bark India Charitable Trust as 4 batches, in February and March, 2022.

Bark India was selected as the first NGO where students were sent for internship. The students who complete their course in one month after intership, worked with temporary registration in Veterinary Council, assisted our veterinarians in treatment, ABCs and other surgeries.

The new kennels provides us extra-facility to keep 4-5 dogs each in 3 small kennels and 6-7 dogs each in 3 big kennels , with the total capacity of 36 dogs at a time.

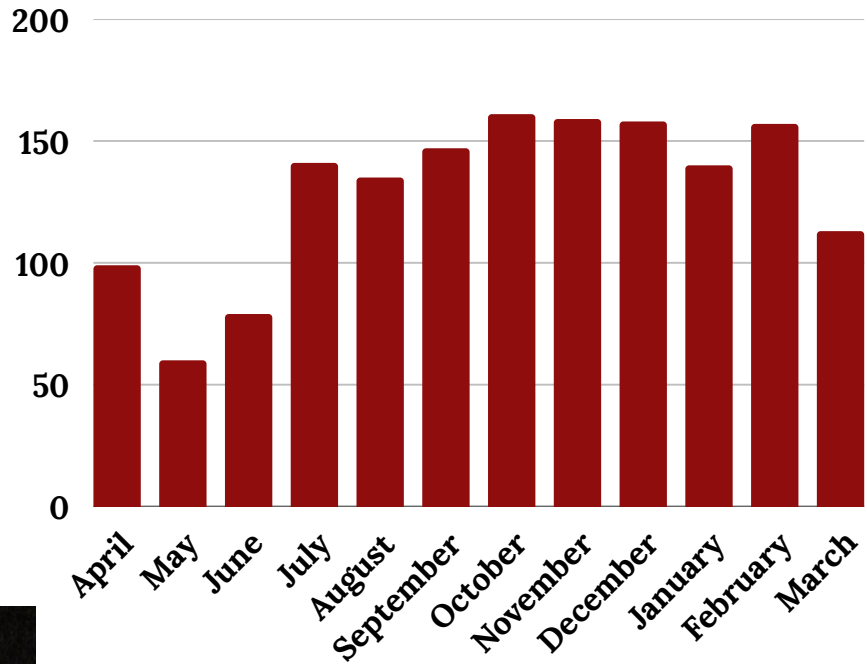

The diagram shows the month-wise number of Rescues done in the year.

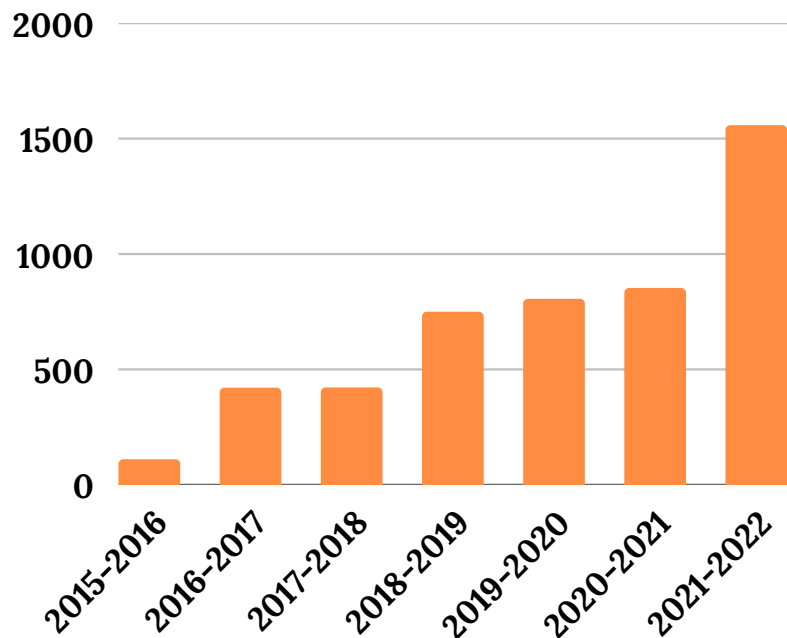


With the CSR support of the 3 companies, the activities of the Trust has been increased 83% than the previous year.

The chart shows how the number of rescues increased in each year from the beginning.

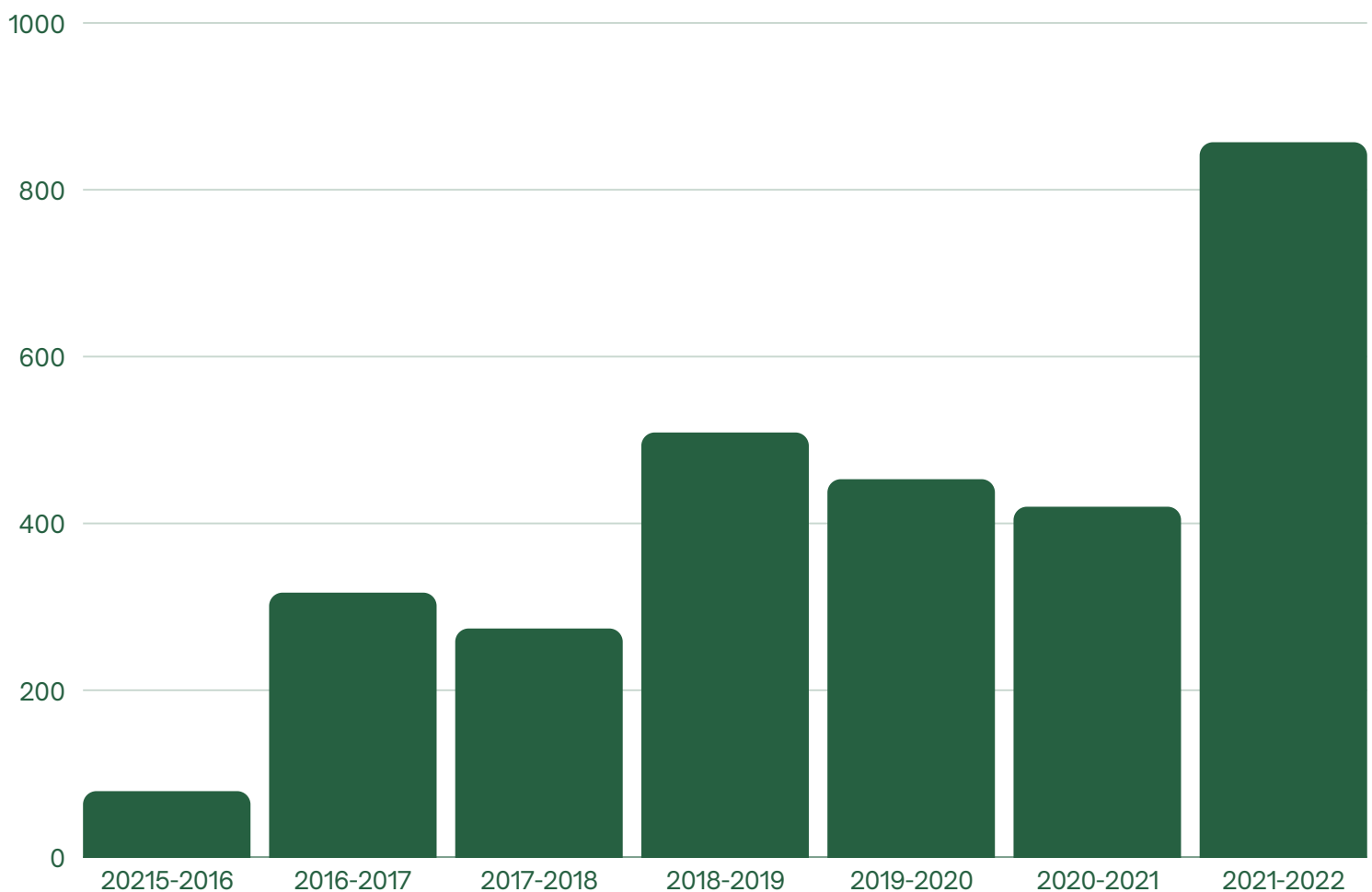

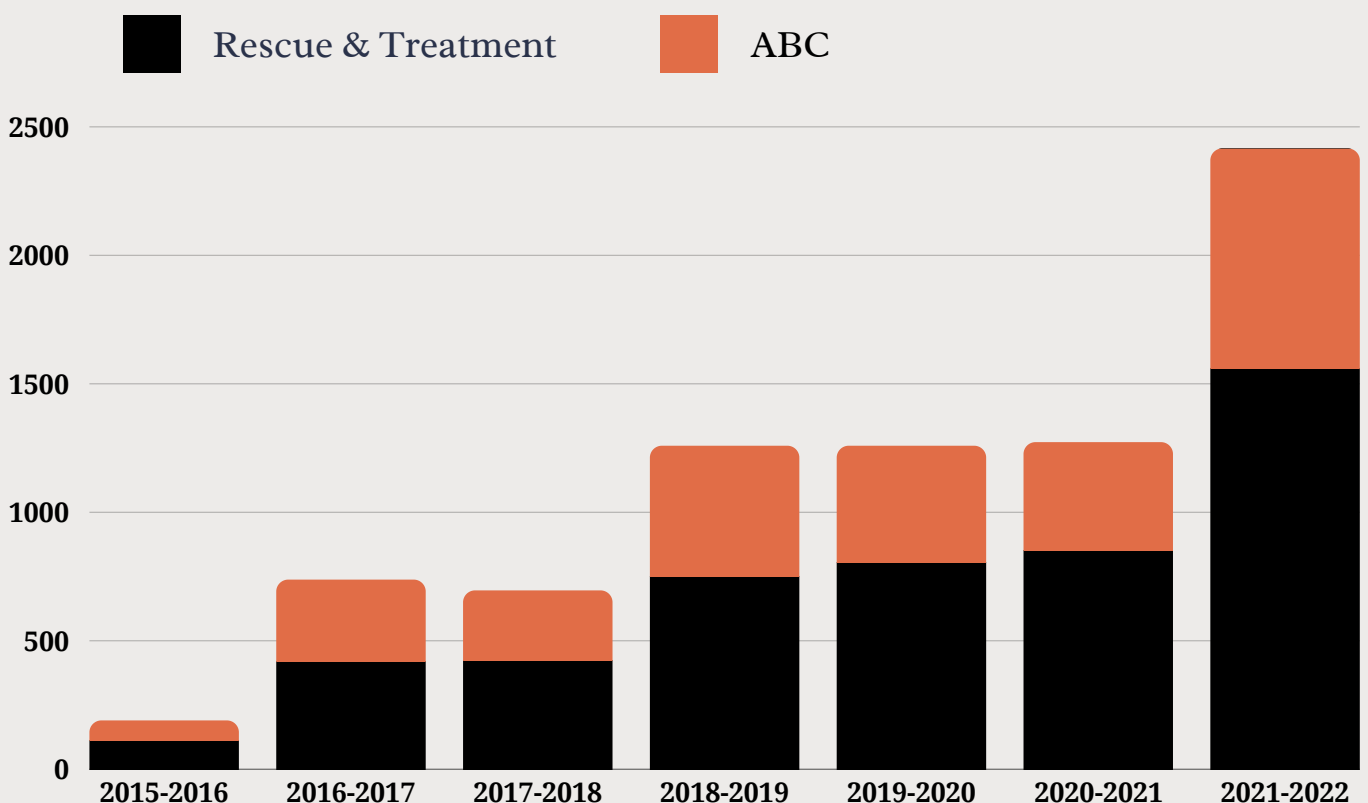
Increase in ABCs

A new kitchen area and shelf have been made in the place where food is cooked for Stray Animal feeding. It provides a decent space to store rice and other necessary items for feeding.

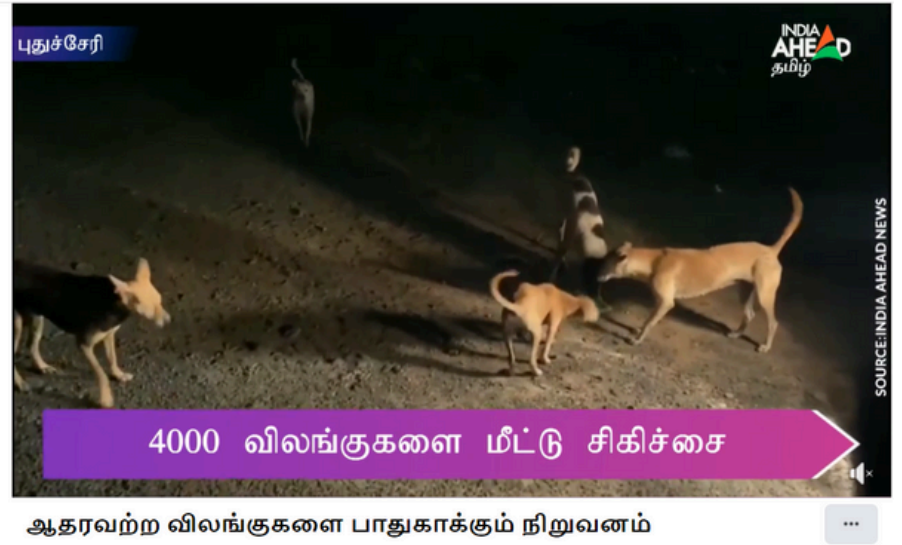

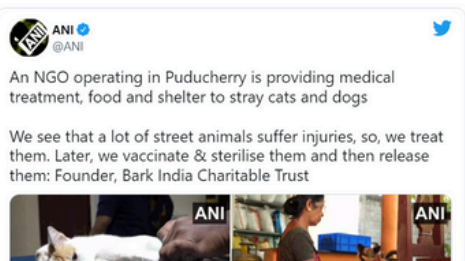

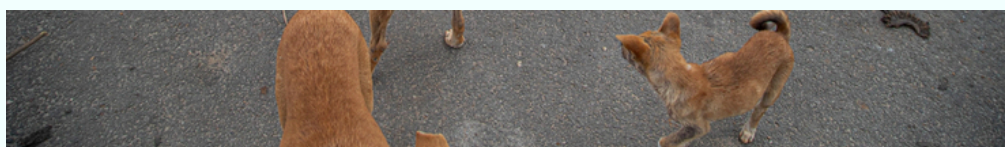




Internet is a great place for happy pictures and videos of pet dogs and cats, but what about the stray animals whose wounds do not fit the aesthetic of popular influencers. There is an NGO in Puducherry that has taken the initiative to give medical treatment, food, and shelter to stray cats and dogs. "We see that a lot of street animals suffer injuries, so, we treat them. Later, we vaccinate & sterilize them and then release them: Founder, Bark India Charitable Trust," ANI tweeted quoting the NGO founder.

Another day, another year for Sanjukta Lal to feed.

Each day, Lal prepares chicken and rice for scores of street dogs. Then she ventures out, during a nationwide stay-at-home order, to drop off the meals at various places around the southern Indian city of Puducherry.

Lal is one of the animal lovers looking after India's 33 million free-roaming dogs, many of which can't find food during the world's largest lockdown to stop the spread of COVID-19. With shops and restaurants shuttered from March 23 until at least May 18, the routine main source of restaurant—garbage scraps—is gone.

Anticipating this problem, the Animal Welfare Board of India issued a letter two days before restrictions went into effect, declared feeding "companion and stray animals is an essential service." The letter encouraged cities to allow people to feed street animals during the lockdown because without that aid, large numbers of animals would "starve as a number of other cities, including Delhi and Jaipur, are issuing 'feeder passes' that permit people to leave their homes to care for street animals—such as dogs, cows, birds, and monkeys—mostly on their own time.

Lal, a volunteer at Bark India Charitable Trust, sometimes stays out until 1 a.m. feeding dogs. Activists like her are doing everything they can, but it's not enough, she says in a phone interview. "There are dogs who go hungry for about seven days. Then they get one meal, maybe, on the eighth day."

In Puducherry, formerly Pondicherry, most of the city's...

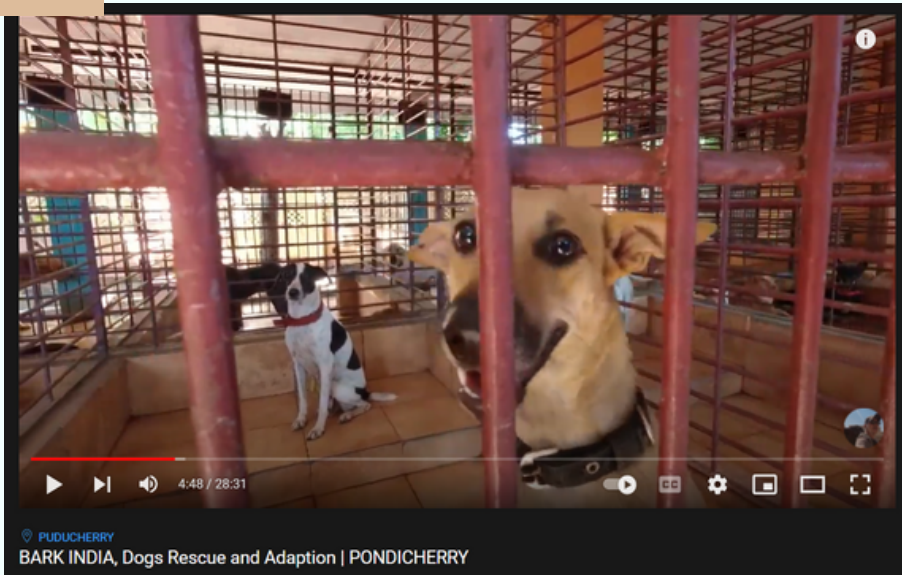

For instance, Sanjukta Lal, who volunteers with Bark India, a charitable trust for street dogs in Puducherry, feeds roughly 150 canines every day in the city and firmly stands by her mission. The 67-year-old has faced the antagonism of neighbours over the 11-odd years she has been taking care of the dogs of Puducherry. "Why don't you feed children on the streets instead of dogs, they ask me," Lal says, referring to her critics. "Why don't you do that, I tell them, while I feed my dogs? Unlike humans, dogs can't work and earn money to buy food."

The pandemic hit our country's beloved street dogs like a tsunami. Many lost their lives from starvation and ignorance. But, many were saved by our nation's good samaritans who roamed the streets every day with food cooked in warm compassion.

If you ended up here, it means that you too are one of those dog feeder angels. And now you're looking to do more than just feeding and fostering your street fur babies.

If that's the case, here are four ways you can take more meaningful action to care for your community dogs this year.

Don't ignore the sick

We often think that doing something for an injured or sick dog is too cumbersome. But the truth is, with the growing network of NGOs and animal welfare communities in the country, it's really easy to get help.

I recently sought help for a street dog (I named her Seeti because she always comes running at the sound of my whistle) who had TVT, a type of life-threatening cancer. I called up a vet in my area who directed me to [Bark India Charitable Trust](#). Their volunteers came within 24hrs to pick Seeti up, started her on chemotherapy, and dropped her back in no time. She's been recovering very well ever since.
